



Welcome back! The Higgins reopens

After five long months of lockdown, the Higgins reopened its doors to visitors on Tuesday 25th August. Local shops and businesses began to open over the summer as restrictions were relaxed, and the Council has now judged it safe to begin a phased reopening of its leisure and culture services.

Needless to say, this move comes with stringent infection measures being put in place, all of which will affect the experience of visiting the Higgins; in the first place, timed entry tickets will be necessary for all visits so that visitor numbers can be kept low enough to allow social distancing. Inside the museum there will be a one way system in operation with separate entrance and exit routes, and hand washing and sanitising facilities will be available throughout the building. Interactive displays and information folders have all been removed but you will be able to access these on mobile devices by scanning new QR codes. In addition, the Higgins will be collecting contact details for visitors to support NHS Test and Trace programme.

It is hoped that many of these measures will be temporary ones and that they will not deter Friends and others from visiting - like all museums, the Higgins thrives when it is full of interested and engaged visitors. Please visit as soon as you feel able!

What you need to know:

- You will have to wear a face mask at all times during your visit (children under 11 and those with medical conditions are exempted).
- Toilets are open and are being cleaned regularly. Please be prepared to queue if necessary.
- The Higgins shop is open.

Friends' Lecture Programme To Zoom or not to Zoom...

Our last lecture season, which had started with some great talks and increased visitor numbers, came to an abrupt close at the start of the COVID-19 crisis. Here Committee member Rod Calvert explains the Friends' approach to this season's forthcoming lectures.

Given the knowledge of the demographics of our members and the certainty that lectures as we know them won't be possible for some indeterminate time, the Committee struggled with the questions: Would our esteemed lecturers be up for Zoom delivery and indeed would our members be pleased to participate in such a programme if we were able to create it. A membership survey revealed overwhelming support for the idea and with a bit of persuasion here and there our speakers came on board.

With that comes the practicality and the delivery of the programme. So how about members who are not confident about the technology to be supported? Every member will be given the opportunity for a one-on-one tuition session before the first lecture. Fortunately we know from the survey that many members are already Zoom-savvy and will not require help but those who do are covered.

On the night it will be a case of 'clicking to join' and participants will enter a 'waiting room' where they will wait expectantly, meanwhile frantic clicking and checking will be going on to ensure both the speaker and the slides are functioning. During the talk members are asked to be on MUTE - so that deliveries, random phone calls etc don't disrupt proceedings. We have a big button and can mute everyone with one click if things get out of control. Opening up for audience questions might be a bit chaotic but we can try! We'll also hope to have some opportunity for virtual socialising at the close of each lecture, so please have your drinks and nibbles at the ready.
